ADDENDUM TO RESUME

Heidi M. Hurd

Summary of the Gains Made by the University of Illinois College of Law Between 2002-2007

(NOTE: During this period, I served as the eleventh Dean of the Illinois College of Law and had the good fortune to work with very talented and very dedicated faculty members, administrators, students, and alumni to advance what we then called the College's "agenda of excellence." The below accomplishments are far more theirs than mine.)

FUND-RAISING

Solicited and received a \$50M anonymous unrestricted estate gift--the largest gift ever given to the College of Law and, at the time, the largest gift ever given to the University of Illinois.

Solicited and received what was, at the time, the second-largest gift ever made to the College of Law, an unrestricted \$5M estate gift.

Solicited and received a \$1M gift for the creation of a new Health Law and Policy Program.

Solicited and received three \$500,000 Faculty Scholar Positions, three \$1M Faculty Professorships, and \$3.5M in student scholarships and awards.

Increased the College's Annual Fund by 28.3%.

Increased the total number of donors giving to the College of Law by 28.3%.

Launched a Class Gift Program that achieved a 42% participation rate in its first year, a 60% participation rate in its second year, and a 76% participation rate in its third year, with a 100% participation rate in all years from LL.M. students.

Secured an initial \$600,000 gift to fund early planning and possible designs for a new law school building (a project still on hold after the 2008 downturn in the market and the state's on-going budget crisis).

Total New Business for the College of Law increased from just over \$1M in FY03 to almost \$6M in FY04 to \$7.5M in FY05, setting the stage for the \$50 Million Campaign that was launched in FY06.

Exceeded initial \$50M goal during the first 18 months of the University-wide "Campaign for Brilliance," raising almost \$70M.

By 2007, was 48% of the way toward raising the new goal of an additional \$50M.

STUDENT AND FACULTY IMPROVEMENTS

Significantly increased incoming student credentials to place Illinois law students among the nation's Top 15 based on LSAT scores (taking the College's LSAT median from 162 to 166). Improved the entering class GPA to place Illinois law students within the Top-25 by that measure (taking the College's GPA from 3.2 to 3.52).

Significantly expanded the national representation of the College's student body, drawing almost 50% of the College's students from out of state by 2007.

Significantly diversified the College's student body, making the College of Law the most racially, ethnically, and religiously diverse law school in Illinois and within the Big Ten schools between 2003-2007. (Northwestern's classes were less diverse than Illinois' by 7 percentage points, and there was not a school in Illinois or within the Big Ten that otherwise exhibited a diversity percentage within 10 percentage points of Illinois'.)

Launched an alumni-student mentoring program that paired accepted students with alumni around the country who could advise them on their initial choice of law school and who could help to recruit them to Illinois, and who thereafter mentored those who opted to attend the Illinois College of Law throughout their three years of legal study.

Recruited 17 tenured and tenure-track faculty, most of whom were lateral hires from peer and higher-ranked law schools who imported established reputations of national prominence to the College of Law, and most of whom possessed Ph.D.'s in other disciplines (political science, history, economics, psychology, philosophy, medicine) that allowed them to approach domestic and international legal and policy problems with a diverse array of methodological tools.

Lowered the student/faculty teaching ratio from 16:1 to 12:1.

Broadened the curriculum and introduced small section classes in the first year program.

Created multidisciplinary degree programs to encourage a multi-disciplinary approach to problems of national and international scope.

Encouraged cross-disciplinary teaching between law faculty and faculty in other colleges, with cross-listed courses that would engage law students with students in business, psychology, history, philosophy, economics, sociology, engineering, animal sciences, agriculture, education, and medicine.

Launched a junior faculty mentoring program with "benchmark moments" during each academic year and an informal year-end summary requirement.

Introduced a junior faculty conference fund which accorded all untenured faculty members \$5,000/year (over and above their research budgets) for the purposes of

enabling them to host conferences, roundtables, guest speakers, etc., so as to become known by, and showcase their work to, leading scholars within their fields.

Improved faculty productivity from a ranking in the mid-30's to seventh in the nation based on submissions to the Social Science Research Network.

STAFFING, COMMUNICATIONS AND INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENTS

Created a full-time directorship of an Office of International Programs to spearhead international programming, the hiring of international faculty, the creation of an international alumni organization, the creation of an international fellowship program, a partnership with the American Bar Foundation to create an international law and policy program, the expansion of the College's international student degree programs, etc.

Created and staffed a Communications and Marketing Department to pair faculty members with members of the media in exploring and responding to topics of domestic and international importance. Launched the only television program in the country ("Illinois Law") to feature law faculty and attorneys, legislators, judges, and policy makers discussing questions of current interest to the public (a program that aired weekly for four years).

Expanded the staffing and reallocated responsibilities among staff within the Admissions Office, the Development Office, the Computer and Technological Services Office, the Office of Student Affairs, the Career Planning and Placement Office, and the Office of Budget and Planning, to make maximally efficient the administrative capabilities of the College of Law.

Significantly refurbished the College's public spaces, including all classrooms, locker rooms, study spaces, lobbies, cafeteria, library, administrative offices, and faculty and staff lounges.

Built two new suites of faculty offices so as to be able to integrate the clinical faculty's offices with the tenured/tenure track faculty's offices.

Expanded and reconfigured clinical spaces and student journal areas and created group study rooms for collaborative student study.

Built a large new conference facility in which to hold faculty workshops, faculty meetings, conferences, faculty-student seminars, College Board meetings, continuing legal education events, etc.

Raised initial funds (\$600,000) and spearheaded the early planning and designs for a new College of Law building.
