Before leaving The *Post* in August, completed a project on why homicides by adolescent, young male killers in the United States jumped 145% from 1985 to 1996. Two-part series about how young male killers are created published in The *Post* November 29 and 30, 1998.

February 1984 to April 1984

Covered the U.S. State Department for the Foreign Desk of The *Post*. Wrote about U.S. foreign policy toward Africa, Third World economic development and covered foreign breaking news stories from the State Department and foreign embassies.

March 1979 to January 1984

West Africa Bureau Chief for The *Post* based in Abidjan, Ivory Coast. Covered West, Central and East Africa. Wrote about military coups, results of Sahelian drought, the impact on average citizens of various economic development models, such as communist, socialist and capitalist, and produced numerous feature stories about 33 different African nations. Sent to Beirut, Lebanon and Damascus, Syria from June to September 1982 to cover the Israeli invasion of Lebanon.

Highlight of five-year stint – Returned to the Kilibwoni farming and cattle-raising community in Western Kenya where I had been a Peace Corps volunteer high school teacher from 1969-1970. Wrote a four-part front page series on the economic, social and cultural changes which had occurred there in the intervening 13 years.

September 1978 to February 1979

An assistant foreign editor on the Foreign Desk of The *Post.* Edited foreign correspondents' stories from 17 *Post* overseas bureaus. Flew to Nigeria November 1978 to cover the diplomatic maneuvering between U.S. and Nigeria on a timetable for Zimbabwe and independence.

March 1978 to September 1978

Covered the vigorously contested three-way electoral campaign for Mayor of Washington while assigned to the City Desk of The *Post.*

The race was the second ever mayoral race under limited home rule granted by Congress in 1974. Marion Barry, the underdog who won the contest, later became a well-known, controversial politician.

September 1977 to February 1978

Traveled and wrote in the Caribbean countries of Trinidad & Tobago, Barbados, Guadeloupe, Martinique and St. Thomas.

October 1976 to August 1977

Traveled into Angola to live with the guerrillas of the National Movement for the Total Independence of Angola (UNITA), for a second time, at the early stages of African nation's bitter civil war. The conflict erupted after the Portuguese granted independence in 1975. By prearrangement, rendezvoused with guerrillas on the Zambian-Angolan border then sneaked into Angola with UNITA guerrilla escort. Walked on foot for 2,100 miles through Angola's war zone during 7 ½ months of reporting.

Returned to Washington in July to write seven-part front-page series, which was published in August.

Angola's civil war ended with the killing of UNITA leader, Jonas Savimbi, in a military gun battle in February 2002.

September 1974 to September 1976

Worked on The *Post's* City Desk covering Washington's Superior Court and School Board elections.

Published two front-page series on two aspects of heroin traffic in Washington: The first series was about where the heroin in Washington was grown in Mexico's Sierra Madre Occidental, the highlands of Turkey, and the Asian Golden Triangle of Laos, Burma, and Thailand, and how the heroin traveled to Washington along three international trails. The second series covered what happened to the heroin once it arrived in Washington:

- How it was distributed, where the city's seven open-air markets were located
- How addiction was spreading through the city
- Why heroin overdose deaths appeared in geographic neighborhood clusters
- The impact of a mother's active heroin addiction on her heroin-addicted infant son immediately after his birth.

April 1974 to August 1974

During an April lecture tour of California state universities and Stanford University about Angola, the Portuguese military's Armed Forces Revolutionary Council overthrew the Salazar-Caetano dictatorship.

The Armed Forces Council sent me a telex message at The *Post* saying they had read my Angolan series published in 1973 and invited me to come write about the colonial side of Angola.

Traveled three months on the colonial side of Angola and published a front-page series in August about Angola's shaky transition to independence and the possibility of a civil war.

January 1974 to March 1974

Worked general assignment on the City Desk covering daily stories.

May 1973 to December 1974

At the invitation of the UNITA guerrilla's U.S. representative, Connie Hillard, who was then a student at Harvard University, I made my first trip into the Portuguese colony of Angola. Met an armed guerrilla escort on the Zambian-Angolan border. Traveled 400 miles over a four-month trek on foot into Angola and wrote about life with the UNITA guerrillas, which was one of three forest-based Angolan guerrilla movements fighting to oust the Portuguese from the country.

The other two movements fighting the Portuguese were the Popular Movement for the Liberation of Angola (MPLA) and the National Front for the Liberation of Angola (FNLA).

June 1972 to April 1973

Covered Montgomery County while assigned to The *Post's* Maryland Desk. Wrote about all aspects of life in one of the richest of Washington's suburbs with special emphasis on the explosive suburban housing growth overwhelming the Metropolitan area's sewage system, thereby, causing extensive pollution of the Potomac River and the Chesapeake Bay.

February 1971 to May 1972

Worked on The *Post's* City Desk on general assignment reporting daily news.

September 1968 to January 1971

Took two-year, five-month leave of absence from The *Post*. Did a semester of teacher training courses at Columbia University in preparation for work as a Peace Corps volunteer rural high school teacher.

Book project Defining Moments in Black and White.

The project has expanded from the original initiator, Judith Williams Lyles, a retired Eastern Illinois University African American professor in educational psychology, to include a white, socially liberal writer Griffin Jasper Stockley, who grew up privileged in the 1950s in rigidly segregated small town Arkansas; white male truck driver Cesare Vodopia, a Tea Party conservative whose live-in female companion is African American; black, working-class general laborer and recovering alcoholic Harold Tisdale, who grew up in the 1950s in North Charleston, S. C.; a white cousin and transportation expert, Gregory Dash, of Ardmore, Pennsylvania. Also, an upper-class white couple, both of who trace their family origins back to Virginia's 17th century Tidewater plantocracy, Richard Ruffin and Evelyn Randolph Ruffin. Richard Ruffin is also descended from a prominent antebellum wealthy slave owner and Confederate Army officer, Edmund Ruffin. The project includes two black women tied to the United Daughters of the Confederacy, Georgia Benton of Savannah, Georgia and Nessa Baskerville-Johnson of Richmond, Virginia. A retired academic Jewish male, Gerald Bender, who settled in Los Angeles after growing up in a segregated Minneapolis and a Jewish counselor and her husband, Julie and Jon Winter, who grew up in middle class, white enclaves in New York City; John C. Dortch, a black evangelist in Beaufort, South Carolina, and Lisa Grimes, a black woman Teaneck, New Jersey, who grew up white.

No interviews were done during the fall 2015 semester as my research accounts were not refunded until February 2016 because of Illinois's budget impasse.

Even so, extensive interviews but not final interviews have been completed with Lyles, Stockley, Vodopia, Tisdale, Bender and Benton. Beginning short interviews were completed during spring break 2016 with the Ruffin couple in Amissville, Virginia and Baskerville-Johnson in Richmond.

In the coming summer months, there will be follow up interviews with the Ruffins, Benton and Baskerville-Johnson, and first-ever interviews with Dortch, the Winters and Grimes.

<u>2015</u>

Since January 2014, I have been interviewing and researching a book project with the working title, *Defining Moments in Black and White*

Since January 2014, have been interviewing and researching a book project entitled, *Defining Moments in Black and White*. The idea for this project came out of interviews with a retired Eastern Illinois University (EIU) professor, Dr. Judith Williams Lyles. Judy Lyles was born and grew up in Mattoon, Illinois, about 16 miles west of Coles County's seat of Charleston, where EIU is located. An African American, Judy was the first to inadvertently integrate Mattoon's city pool when, as an elementary school-aged girl, she went to the pool for swimming lessons sponsored by the local chapter of the Red Cross. When interviewed over the course of several days at her Charleston home, Judy, a Ph. D. holder and a woman of singular achievements, in 2002 expressed deep, contemporary fears and anxieties about living as a minority person in southern Illinois.

Two of her childhood experiences stood out: Leader and sole African American of the local Girl Scout Troop at age 11, she was deeply hurt and embarrassed when one of the girls in the troop yelled, "Last one back is a nigger" when the adult scout mistress told the girls to collect fire wood when on a camping trip. "That was a *defining moment* for me," she said. In her freshman year at Millikin University in Decatur, she was told by a male schoolmate, the nephew of Mattoon's school superintendent, that she had won the Mattoon Homecoming Queen election contest the year before, but the school superintendent and school board felt that could not have an African American homecoming queen, so made the second place winner the queen and Judy a runner up. Fifty years passed before she told her parents in their Mattoon home about the switched Homecoming votes. Her father excused himself to retreat to another room to cry in private!

Using the multiple interview process of Immersion Journalism, besides the first set of four interviews with Judith Lyles, I've also done the first set of four interviews with several others: A white male Arkansas native and book author, who had an epiphany as a young adult about The South's racial hierarchy while serving as a 1960s Peace Corps community organizer outside of Cartagena, Columbia; a black female retired school teacher and only African American member of the Savanna, GA chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy; a white male truck driver of Dutch descent in Columbia, MD; a black male drifter originally from North Charleston, SC, who now lives in Washington, D. C.; a retired Los Angeles Jewish male university professor who grew up in Minneapolis; a white male American urban transportation expert in Ardmore, PA with whom I share a third great grandfather. As expected, some of the first set of interviews about a person's defining ethnic experiences were revealing and some were unclear that any defining experience has ever taken place.

I will be returning to interview these persons many more times with the expectation of finding what particular experience or experiences were defining.
